It's ironic that in a world and country so culturally diverse, where one person is 100% unlike the person next to him or her, the practice of using labels to identify people or groups of people is unfortunate. **Using labels to define someone isn't fair or helpful.** It isn't helpful to the patient or doctor. It isn't helpful to the student or the teacher. It isn't helpful to the parent or child.

At Pine Belt Mental Healthcare Resources (PBMHR), we believe that patients enjoy a better quality of life when labels are removed. We believe in treating the individual, not the diagnosis.

The men, women and children in our care are treated as people with a diagnosis of mental illness, addiction or behavioral problem, but above all, they are treated as a person first. Why? Because we recognize them in our own families, friends, neighbors and coworkers. They are real people with real specific needs. And when the label is removed, one sees a person with hopes, dreams and emotions.

People should not be treated differently because of a diagnosis. They should be treated differently because of who they are as a person.



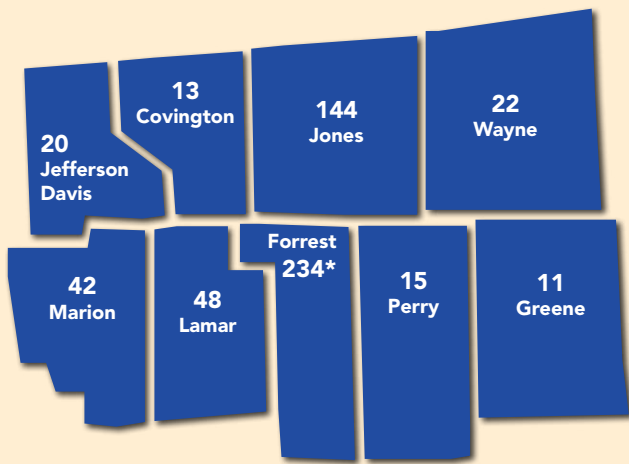
Behavioral healthcare problems affect more people each year than cancer, heart and lung disease combined. Mental illnesses and addictions can affect persons of any age, race, religion or income. Mental illnesses are not the result of personal weakness, lack of character or poor upbringing. Mental disorders fall along a continuum of severity.

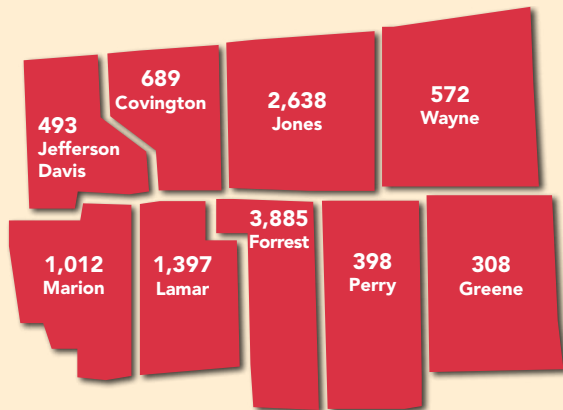

Geographic Distribution of Clients Served

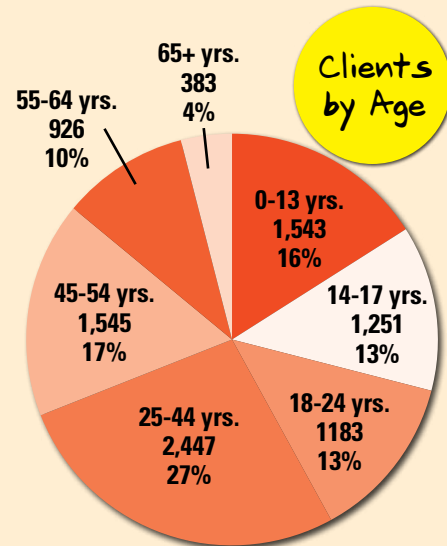


Program Distribution of Clients Served

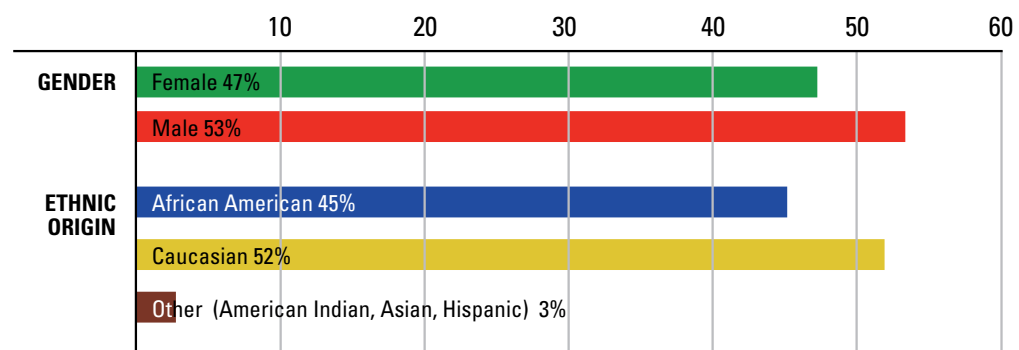

Client Profile



During the last seven years, PBMHR secured more than **\$21.6 million in** targeted grant funding. Obtaining additional financial resources is an ongoing effort so that we are better equipped to meet the needs of individuals in our service area.

Community Food Grant – \$299,963

funded by the U.S.D.A. for a three year project period to improve food security of adults living with serious mental illness who attend the Oasis Clubhouse. In partnership with the Forrest County Extension Service and the Workforce Development Center at Pearl River Community College, consumers will plant community gardens, learn about nutrition and the importance of fresh produce in their diets, shopping on a budget, personal food preparation and prepare for careers in food preparation through attendance in a culinary skills course and training in catering.

Job Access & Reverse Commute Grant – \$198,000

Awarded by the Mississippi Department of Transportation to provide transportation for Oak Arbor residents to and from work.

VA Capital and Per Diem Grant – \$661,490

Initially provided from the VA to build twelve 2-bedroom apartments for homeless veterans on the Oak Arbor property. Additionally, up to \$301,490 per year will perpetually be funded to provide support services to residents.

Affordable Housing Program – \$168,000

Awarded to grant partner BancorpSouth from the Dallas Home Loan Bank to provide gap financing for the construction of the VA Capital apartment projects.

Homeless Veterans Reintegration Program – \$598,704

Awarded for a three year project period by the U.S. Department of Labor to provide job placement services for homeless veterans residing at Oak Arbor.

Stand Down Grant – \$7,000

Awarded by the U.S. Department of Labor to operate a Stand Down event designed to engage homeless veterans into services provided by PBMHR.

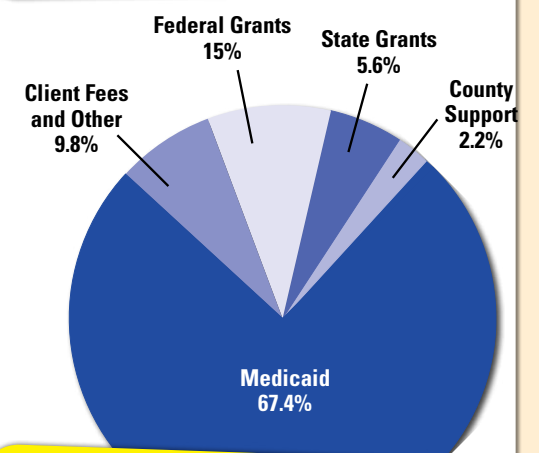
Emergency Shelter Grant – \$73,480

Awarded by the Mississippi Development Authority for assistance with operational expenses for one year at Ivy Trace, the Oaks and Haven House.

Juvenile Detention Center Grant – \$40,000

Awarded by the Mississippi Department of Mental Health to provide intensive case management and therapeutic services at the Forrest and Jones counties' juvenile detention centers.
